The Colors of Advent

There are four colors involved distinctly with Advent. Three are clearly shown in the picture to the right.

Purple reminds of royalty as Jesus was the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.



The Rose (Pink) candle is lit on the third Sunday of Advent and it reminds of refreshment.

Green wreaths adorn the Advent Wreath and other places in the church and they remind us of new birth.

Blue or properly Sarum Blue reminds of Mary who, when asked if she would be the Mother of Jesus said Yes.

Now a question for you. Is the Advent Wreath a religious symbol?

While it may be a symbol now and it is placed in honor in many churches of many denominations, its origin is not religious at all. The wreath with many candles was often seen in bars long before the spread of the Christian religion. The candles were lit until the winter solstice, or the time when the days began to get longer and there was more sunlight.

A German Lutheran Pastor is credited with turning the secular symbol into a religious one by associating the tradition with Advent and the lighting of four candles, one each Sunday until Christmas Day. A fifth candle is sometimes added to the wreath an lit on Christmas. It is called the Christ Candle and reminds us of the birth of Jesus.

Question for next week: Was Jesus born on December 25th?



The Vestry

In the Episcopal Church the Vestry is the governing church board of trustees. At the Annual Meeting in January, the congregation elects three people every year to serve members of the vestry. At St. Paul's there are nine elected members. The parish Rector is the President of the Vestry and presides at all vestry meetings.

The Vestry has three major purposes and shares leadership with the Rector on other areas of parish leadership. Those three are:
The Stewardship of Parish Finances
The Stewardship of Parish Property
The election of a priest to serve as the Rector once approved by the Bishop.



Transgender Day of Remembrance

St. Paul's Episcopal Church sponsored a solemn service honoring Transgender Day of Remembrance on the evening of November 21, 2021.

The service, a tradition of the parish, including a reflection by the Reverend Jeremy Peters the Senior Pastor of Court Street United Methodist Church of Flint.

Since the last Transgender Day of Remembrance, 69 transgender people were killed, most by acts of violence.

Sixty-nine candles were lit as each name was read aloud along with some information about each person.
