Why Rose (Pink)?

The third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudete Sunday.

Gaudete, comes from "Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, Gaudete" or "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice."

The imperative coming in the midst

of what was understood as a penitential season seems odd. The pink or rose candle is lit recognizing that in Christ we see and know joy. As the season of Advent is all about hope, as we prepare for the arrival of Jesus, it is important for us to see and know the joy that comes from knowing the grace of Christ and the love of God.

The readings for Gaudete Sunday focus on the words of St. John the baptizer. Because the gospel reading is so graphic in description, we can almost see John standing in the middle of the Jordan river calling out to people to mend their ways before the arrival of Jesus.

John followed his calling with great enthusiasm even if he lacked manors and tact. He was not pastoral or loving as he addressed those who came out to see him. The people watching were not there because of their religious belief, they were there for entertainment and John was rough, strange and outer worldly. He must have been a sight that none had seen before, but his words gripped them and many were baptized.

I caution you to see that John's baptism (dunking) was quite a bit different than how we understand the sacrament of baptism now. John was calling people to "Prepare" and be "ready" by being cleansed of sin. Many Hebrew people of John's time, especially those who live in community would practice a baptism like ritual called a Mikvah which is a multi-step bath ritual that also is cleansing, a ritual immersion. In many hotels in Jerusalem, a mikvah facility is available for use prior to an important event planned for the synagogue.

John's call would have been unique, but more because of John and the idea of the coming of the expected messiah. The pink candle says to all—prepare and be joyful.


