She found that cardboard was a very interesting material to work with and produced many artworks with different mediums using cardboard as her base. One example is of her self-portrait called "My America," which has been showcased in the Bombay Sapphire art competition, and Flint Public Library for the Pierians of Flint.

The Reverend Don Davidson, Priest-in-Charge

Priest's-in-Charge have many duties not alone the ministry and work of being the Interim Rector of a parish for a brief time. I am deeply honored to serve at St. Paul's and June marks my tenth month. That means I have begun the second half of my time with you.

Your Vestry and your Finance Committee are hard at work to come up with the documents necessary to attract and later, with God's help, call a new Rector. Before being able to finalize our resources, I believe it will be helpful to give the congregation a full and transparent report on where we are, especially financially, as we move to the day that the new Rector arrives.

With that thought in mind, **I** am announcing my intention to call a special congregational meeting sometime in August for the purpose of considering two by-law amendments and receiving a report from our Treasurer and Director of Finance on our current financial status. There will be no further business allowed at this meeting.

As you may already know, I am serving as part-time. I admit, I have been working way over 20 hours a week because, as you may know, this parish needs a full-time priest. One of the realities of being part-time is that my position is not as much of a draw on our budget, indeed, one of the reasons we are able to continue our staffing is my part-time status.

Obviously, *this worries me and your vestry*. As members of our community you need to know where we are in a clearly presented way so that you understand our situation as we look toward the fall Stewardship Campaign.

The two by-law amendments relate to our shrinking attendance and membership. As it stands, we need 50 people for a quorum in order to hold an Annual Meeting or Congregational Special Meeting. Sadly, we rarely see 50 people on any Sunday morning. The proposal will change the quorum from an exact number to those present. The Vestry will also ask the congregation to reduce the total membership of the vestry from 9 to 6, electing two rather than three people every year. The Rector, as the President of the Vestry, would vote in the case of a tie.

These two amendments would become effective at the end of the meeting. Those elected in previous years would continue to serve-out there terms, and the Vestry would be permitted to fill the current vacancy as that seat was elected under the current by-laws.

I will announce the date and time of this congregational meeting as soon as I can.

I promise you all that I will continue to work as hard as I can and focus my attention on the doing of God's will, of loving the people entrusted to my cure and to serve this wonderful parish with all the energy I can muster. I ask your prayers and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

[Episcopal News Service] The 80th General Convention will proceed in person this July in Baltimore, Maryland, but it likely will be shorter and smaller, with enhanced safety protocols to further minimize the risk of COVID-19 infections, according to an outline of potential changes presented May 11 by The Episcopal Church's presiding officers.

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry and the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, president of the House of Deputies, discussed their preliminary plan for a modified General Convention at a special meeting of Executive Council held online and livestreamed. They said that

neither cancelation nor another postponement of General Convention is a viable option.

"There are essential matters for the governance and good order of the church which must be transacted. We are committed to holding the 80th General Convention in Baltimore this summer," Curry said in his <u>remarks</u>. "I know how much this commitment to the city of Baltimore and to the Diocese of Maryland matters. But obviously, with the ongoing variation of the COVID pandemic, we are likewise committed to gathering in the safest and healthiest way possible.

Scholarships Needed for Youth Campers

Summer camp is a wonderful opportunity for children to learn, grow, and develop new friendships.

St Paul's has an opportunity to sponsor scholarships for youth campers to attend Camp Chickagami also known as Camp Chick, the Episcopal Summer Camp located at Presque Isle.

The Outreach Team is working with Crossover, a nonprofit in Flint that St Paul's helped found



with parishes in the area.

Two camp sessions are planned for July to include two sessions of 20 per session (July 10-16, 3rd -5th graders) and (July 24-30, 6th-8th graders). Crossover is outfitting each camper

with the necessary clothing and gear needed for each of the one-week camp sessions.

The cost is \$350 per camper. You have an opportunity to become a scholarship donor in **any amount.**
