Prayers, Thoughts and Consequences No, Really!

Your Vestry has major decisions to make. The decisions are coming at them like a highspeed freight train. The train is unrelenting as the decisions must be made.

For many years, St. Paul's decreasing membership and recently post pandemic anemic attendance has had consequences relating most notably to financial sustainability. We are blessed that we have an endowment, yet, endowments were not created to pay operational expenses (think salaries, heat and a/c).

Our anticipated pledges for 2023 indicate that we will be significantly below 2022. This year we believe we will end the year with a small surplus due to my part-time status. The Vestry has eliminated the once full-time and later part-time position of Administrative Assistant. The consequence is that the priest is now creating and printing all bulletins and newsletters, and there is currently no reasonable way to answer the door or telephone.

At a time with 8% inflation, during a Rector search, the Vestry must decide what to do. The Vestry is the fiduciary or trustees of the parish in that they, under the authority of corporation law, the Canons (law) of the Episcopal Church and our Diocese, and our by-laws. While the Rector (or in my case, Priest-in-Charge (which is a Rector with a specific term), has voice in discussions, only

elected members of the Vestry may vote on these decisions.

At our Vestry meeting in November, unless delayed, the Vestry will vote on the 2023 parish budget. The budget gives the Treasurer and Rector the authority to approve day-to-day expenses without requiring the Vestry to approve every expenditure. The budget is based upon pledges, and income from various funds making-up our endowment. Much of our endowment is restricted to specific use by the original donors, some income is through trusts such as the many trusts named for Charles Barth. The Barth trusts cannot be used for operational expenses.

All of this is complicated. Suffice it to say that currently the funds that keep the lights on and the staff paid come from about 75% endowment and 25% pledges.

The reality is that we do not anticipate having the funds to pay a full-time Rector and current staff in 2023-24. Ouch! We have known this for a while, and the Vestry has taken difficult and unpopular steps to help. It depends on when a new Rector arrives.

Paraphrasing the sign on President Truman's desk, the "Buck stops" with the Vestry.

The Warden's Word

How do you learn to listen to God? I think it requires practice and openness. I have been fortunate for several years to spend two weeks in September without TV, Wi-Fi or cellular service. At first, I want to interpret the sounds to urban life. Periodically a truck will come down the road which is a mile away. A train is 10 miles away but can be heard if you listen carefully. These are so rare that after a few days I do not think of the sound relating to modes of transportation but rather the sounds of nature. Being in an area of few trees, there are only a handful of birds. One needs to listen carefully. They may only make a few chirps before they fly on to a new location.

I think that is how we hear God. We make an effort to be aware of the faint sounds that are different than those we normally hear. We free our mind of any thoughts that will distract our concentration. We ask God to speak to us. And then we are still and listen.

Have you ever been so passionate or focused on a specific outcome that your prayer is a demand for that which you want? How can God answer, when you have already set your mind on the answer. I believe we can let God know how troubled we are but then wait for his response. It is easy for human beings to forget we have not created all that we have. Finding a solution to a problem seems necessary, when really, we can ask for God's help.

Summer is over and we are beginning the Fall Season. We gather our financial pledges, focus on ministries we want to support, and access how much time we will give to spread the kingdom of God. Realizing everything you have is a gift from God, please pray about how you will use your time, talent and treasure. Listen for God speaking to you. Study the scriptures and continue to connect with your St Paul's family.

Youth Arts: UNLOCKED brings artists and arts workshops to justice-involved youth in Flint and Genesee County.


Our goal is to introduce artistic concepts and techniques as a means of connecting, expressing, learning, and discovery.



ALL SAINTS' SERVICE AT GLENWOOD!

The third '150th Celebration' event of the 2022 season will be an All Saints' service at Historic Glenwood Cemetery. Although our first two events (Cornerstone & Reunion) were relatively modest in size and scope, the Glenwood event promises to be a much larger, more complex operation as we leave the comfort of our own space for this special day.

The main event at Glenwood will be an ecumenical, community-wide All Saint's memorial service at 2pm, Sunday October 30, 2022. Clergy from all four Crossover churches will work together in planning and leading that service. The afternoon will also include self-guided cemetery walking tours with docents and storytellers stationed near selected gravesites, specifically those with significant historical ties to the churches and congregations.

Recalling the stated **'Purposes'** of the 150th project, established during the first 150th Steering session last November, I'm delighted that this Glenwood event is shaping up to hit all the marks:

Relationships – Our historic building and its 150th anniversary provides the vehicle, but our 150th celebration is really centered on the parish's role and relationships with our community and our neighbors. The purpose of the project is to celebrate, renew, and establish meaningful ties to the community, its institutions, and our neighbors.

Collaboration - We discussed the importance of building this project in partnership and collaboration with our community stakeholders; never doing alone, that for which we can collaborate.

Sharing Our Gifts - Although the event is will be open and absolutely free to the public, our current thought is to encourage and direct any donations or financial gifts to Crossover Outreach.

Consistent with our earliest hopes, this will be a community-wide project, taking on life outside of our buildings and grounds. We will again, 'open our doors'; but this time they swing outward into the community where we will join our friends and neighbors at Historic Glenwood Cemetery.

- A part-time Rector. We would decrease our expenses by half of the Rector's salary. Benefits including health insurance would not change. This would mean that the Rector would be available at least 2 days a week plus Sunday. Language here is important. Please note part-time Rector not part-time priest. A person is ordained a priest and that is 100% of the time. A Rector is a position.
- Decrease or eliminate remaining staff. The consequences are obvious.
- Use funding for operational expenses from endowment.

I have no doubt there are other possibilities out there, maybe you have one?

I believe it is very important that our community is aware that the Vestry is working through all the possibilities, and recognizes the serious nature of the decisions ahead.

My thanks to our Wardens and Treasurer for their work and help as we labor together.

Be assured, we shall overcome and move forward in Christ Jesus. Don+






I was glad when they said unto me We will go to the house of the Lord!
