OPENING DOORS - AUGUST 27, 2023

On August 24, 1873, the doors of St. Paul's 'new' building were opened for worship at the intersection for the very first time. The historic church building is 150 years old and for the past year, our friends and neighbors have helped us celebrate and remember the role that St. Paul's and its people have played in building our community.

On <u>August 27th, 2023</u> we'll commemorate the anniversary of that first service of 150 years ago, with a '150th Homecoming Worship Service and Community Social'.

BUILDING COMMUNITY

The 150th project was conceived and guided by the recognition that the anniversary represented an opportunity to; *"Open Doors, Welcome Neighbors, Share Gifts, and Build Community"*. The steering committee committed to ensuring that every activity and program would be centered around opportunities to build **relationships** and engage in meaningful **collaboration** within the parish and throughout the community, never doing things alone when there is an opportunity to partner.

Along the way, we've collaborated with the dozens of individuals and organizations, including the University of Michigan-Flint, Glenwood Cemetery, Downtown Development Authority, Friends of the Alley, Keep Genesee County Beautiful, Genesee County Historical Society, Flint City Bike Tours, Flint Social Club, Flint Public Art Project, Sloan Museum of Discovery, Ruth Mott Foundation/Applewood, Saint Cecilia Society, the What's Up Downtown Flint project, Genesee County Sheriff's Office, First Presbyterian Church, Riverside Tabernacle (Now Every Nation Assembly of God Church), Court Street Methodist Church, and the Diocese of Eastern and Western Michigan.

WHAT'S NEXT - 151 YEARS AND BEYOND

Our 150th 'Season of Celebration' has served as a vehicle to build, renew, and restore relationships with our neighbors. The Steering Committee hopes to continue this work going forward and build on the things already accomplished. Watch for upcoming events, including our fall service at Glenwood Cemetery!



A Note from Tom

I once told a principal of mine that I was "rock star" when it came to teaching the civil rights movement. For at least 15 years I had taught American History with what I thought was a pretty thorough unit on the Civil Rights Movement of the 20th century. I covered it all: Plessy vs. Ferguson, Brown vs. Board of Ed., Emmett Till, the Little Rock Nine, The Sit-ins, The Montgomery Bus Boycott, Birmingham, the Freedom Riders, and the speeches of Dr. King.

And now I discover that I wasn't such a rock star after all.


Because I had never heard of the Tougaloo Nine. Who were the Tougaloo Nine? They were nine college kids who staged a sit-in at the whites-only Jackson Main Library in Jackson, Mississippi. They were called the Tougaloo Nine because they all attended Tougaloo College, an historically black college (HBCU) located in Jackson, Mississippi.

Trained for the sit-in by Medgar Evers (the NAACP field secretary who was murdered in 1963), the plan of action was simple. The nine students would go into the library, sit at different tables, and quietly read books. Known as the "read-in", the students were arrested and, incredibly, convicted for disturbing the peace. I guess they were reading too loudly.

It seems laughable now, but the nine Tougaloo kids were pretty darn brave. Although they were sentenced to 30 days in jail and \$100 fine, they very easily could have been lynched.

Mississippi was a viscously racist state, with harsh Jim Crow laws and violent white-supremacy groups. And as I'm sure many of you know, St. Paul's was blessed to have **Al Cook**, one of the Tugaloo Nine, as a long-time member of the congregation. His recent passing has elicited an outpouring of memories of a beloved friend, a gracious gentleman, and a civil rights pioneer.

Jesus said, "...let the oppressed go free..."



Al Cook risked his life to stop oppression. May his life be an inspiration to us all. And may God grant him the blessed rest of eternal peace.

And a safe place to read.

most blessed, most glorious, the Ancient of Days, almighty, victorious, thy great name we praise.

2 Unresting, unhasting, and silent as light, nor wanting, nor wasting, thou rulest in might;

thy justice like mountains high soaring above thy clouds, which are fountains of goodness and love.

3 To all life thou givest, to both great and small; in all life thou livest, the true life of all;

we blossom and flourish as leaves on the tree, and wither and perish but naught changeth thee.

4 Great Father of glory, pure Father of light, thine angels adore thee, all veiling their sight; all praise we would render, O help us to see 'tis only the splendor of light hideth thee.

This song was written by Walter C. Smith in 1867 a Scotsman who was also a clergyperson. In the coming weeks and months, the Stewardship Ministry will plenty of opportunities to share abundant gifts in community.


- Blood Drive: The next event is our Red Cross Blood Drive, which will take place in Barth Hall on July 7, 2023.

 will be published on the parish calendar.



Our St. Paul's Artwalk is truly amazing. The Artwalk is open to everyone with many participating organizations. Such an inspiration to see such amazing talent and breathtaking pieces of art. Our May Artwalk will be held from 6:00-8:00 PM on Friday, June 9, 2023.

One of this month's artist for our Artwalk is *Collette Weier:*

Our musical artist for the month of June will be *Musica Royale*. Musica Royale, founded in 1996, is an early music ensemble based in the metropolitan Detroit area. The ensemble specializes in music of the Renaissance and Middle Ages and also performs classic and contemporary wedding and Christmas music.

Musica Royale is featured annualy at the Michigan Renaissance Festival, and has also performed at the Greater Flint Art Council, Tunes at Noon, Flint Institute of Arts, Somerset Collection, Detroit Institute of Arts, Detroit Science Center, Grand Rapids Science Museum, and numerous weddings and other public and private gatherings. Musica Royale has recorded three CD's: "A Renaissance Christmas", "Renaissance Hits and Near Misses",

"Festival, Frolic, and Fantasy".

Musica Royale incorporates a wide variety of instruments in their performances, both from the Renaissance and Middle Ages such as recorders, crumhorns, harp, violin, guitar, cello, bowed psaltery, and percussion, and also can add contemporary instruments such as flute, oboe, clarinet, saxophone, bassoon, and keyboard.

Musica Royale offers many types of Renaissance, Medieval, Christmas/ December holiday, and traditional music for festive and educational public and private events.
