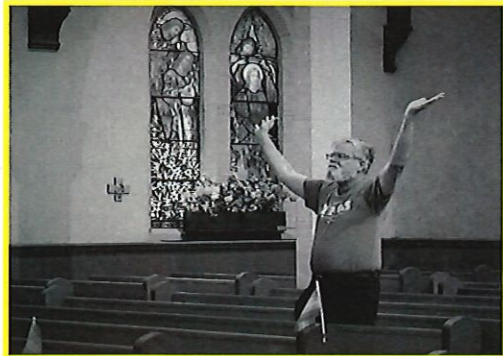
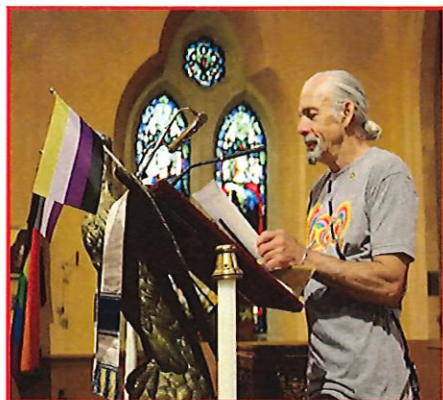

A Note from Tom

Each month, I have an appointment with my spiritual director, Sister Veronica. And each month she asks me what I have been reading. Now, throughout my adult life, I have always rotated the kinds of books I read. I read history, then a biography, then maybe a political book, and then of course, a religious book. Lately, it seemed whenever Sister Veronica would ask me what I was reading, I always seemed to be reading something inappropriate. A few months ago, it was a book about a cheating scandal in pro baseball. Then it was a book about the rock band Led Zeppelin. To make matters worse, I was reading the books slowly and I think I was giving Sister Veronica the impression that I seldom read anything religious.

That all changed when I began to attend our Wednesday Bible Study led by Tim Grant. Tim selected a wonderful book for this month by an author named Barbara Brown Taylor. The title of the book is *Leaving Church*. Although the title sounds irreligious, the book is anything but. It is the story of the author's search for her own faith. I have found it to be a well-written, moving account of a very personal spiritual Journey.

And so, when it came time to answer Sister Veronica's question about reading material, I was thrilled to be able to proudly state, "It's by Barbara Brown Taylor. Have you read her?" (Notice how artfully I dodged the title). She had, of course.

In Tim's class we lingered on a particular passage in the book: "I discovered," writes Taylor, "worship that took place inside God's own heart. The divine pleasure was the pleasure of a mother with her baby at her breast."

This passage reminded me very much of something that Sister Veronica has consistently taught me; God is in all things and there is no part of life too unimportant for God. Having a relationship with God means that, not only is God totally *in and around you*, but also that you are *in* God. Not just worshiping God from afar, but being at one with God, like a mother and child. Not just asking God for big things, but including God in *all* things. All parts of life are relevant to God, and God is in all parts of life.

Bible study happens every Wednesday right after Noon mass. Please consider joining the group as we worship and wonder together about God's unlimited love.

Did you know John Sargis?

Did you know that John Sargis left St. Paul's a substantial donation in his will?

At that time our Vestry decided to put half of the amount away in our investments accounts for our future and use the remainder to improve the daily life at St. Paul's.

John Sargis enabled St. Paul's to purchase: A brand new shiny commercial DISHWASHER! Add a new security system! Replace our obsolete phone system! Add equipment which allows us to live stream our services each week. And still have a bit left over for whatever needs come next.

Barb Manor remembers John Sargis this way: John Paul Sargis served as the Eucharist Minister at the 8:00 am Sunday Morning service at St Paul's Episcopal Church. He drove his red electric Volt to church every Sunday morning. He loved worshipping at St. Paul's. He never looked for a new church when he retired from the Flint Journal and moved to Haslett. After church he would visit with one of his sisters in Flint.

We didn't need to ask why he moved to the Lansing area when he retired. He bled green and white. He graduated from Michigan State University with a degree in Journalism. John worked as the Associated Press Editor at the Flint Journal, then as a Copy editor for the Midland Daily News. He attended many home basketball, football and hockey games of his beloved Spartans. If the game was late on Saturday night, he would remind us he would not make the 8:00 a.m. service.

John often would have his mother and sister join him at church. He also had a cat named Sammy. John adopted the folks that attended 8:00 am services at St. Paul's as his family.

He would buy us gourmet cookies to enjoy with coffee.

Everyone remembers his as a kind, generous and gently man. He was a very quiet person, loved by everyone that met him.

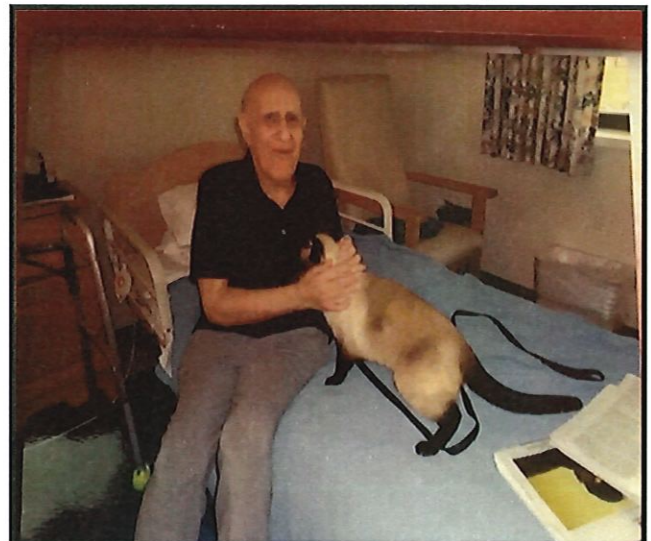

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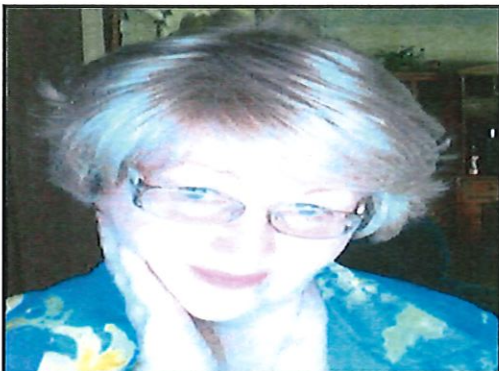
July Artwalk

Real Elements Made Beautifully Into Works of Art

Welcome to St. Paul's Art walk. You are surely to be amazed at the talented artists that participate. The Artwalk is open to everyone with many participating organizations. Our Artwalk will be held from 6:00-8:00 PM on Friday, July 14, 2023. Please come and experience for yourself why St. Paul's Art Walk is Amazing.

One of this month's artist for our Artwalk is **Colleen Ford**. Colleen is a mixed media and watercolor artist who is from mid-Michigan area. She was influenced at an early age by her mother who owned and operated a decorating business. In high school Colleen designed programs for various events, served on decorating committees and was encouraged to pursue a career in art by her art teacher.

Colleen studied drawing, painting, design, composition, ceramics, and art history at the University of Michigan College of Architecture and Design. It was there that she realized that it was a higher calling to find her own expression than to sell her talent commercially. Notwithstanding, she took a position as a commercial artist for awhile where her drawings were featured on the cover and inside of the programs for the Musical Tent theatrical productions. While there one of her paintings was selected to be displayed at a local hospital.



Then Colleen decided to become a teacher. It was during her teaching career that she learned life's lessons and her current values. She taught many subjects preschool through college, most notably here art at Questar School for Gifted Children and Summerfield Community School.

Having retired from teaching, Colleen now finds the time to return to her first love, art. At this point in her life, she finds she has much to draw upon in terms of emotions and subject matter. She works with watercolors, colored pencils and collage in abstract representational work.

Since 2011 she has exhibited her work at the Swartz Creek Art Gallery, the Swartz Creek Senior Center, the Computer Doctor business, Kettering University, the Greater Flint Arts Council and the Flint Institute of Art and other galleries.

We draw our guidance from the Book of Common Prayer

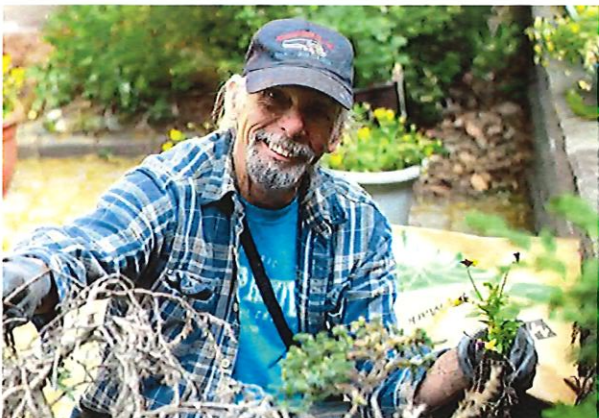
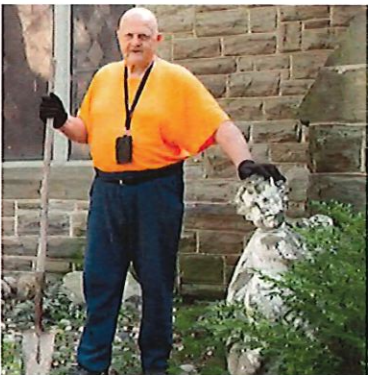
Give us all a reverence for the earth as your own creation, that we may work for health, wholeness and justice for all living things, to your honor and glory. (Form IV)

Rooted in Abundance!

Partners for Sacred Places

Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit.

Jeremiah 17:7-8 NRSV

The theme for our stewardship campaign this year is "Rooted in Abundance," taken from this passage in Jeremiah. The logo for the campaign materials is an extensive root system which supports a tree that continually bears fruit, because even in times of drought it will always reach its roots deeper to find an abundant source of water in a nearby stream. We see such abundance in the investment of previous generations in the effective use of our building filtering through our windows and gleaming through our furnishings. Their rootedness was in developing relationships with community partners that addressed the needs of at risk children, for example, and housing for senior women along other philanthropic civic and cultural concerns. Our work with Partners for Sacred Places (or PSP) continues in St Paul's tradition of opening our doors, welcoming our neighbors, sharing our gifts and building community. We are seeking new opportunities to strengthen and develop relationships with others who share our vision and values. Dexter Clarke of Genesee Health Systems, the community partner who joined us on the Partners team, worked with us on an exercise to flesh out what it would look like to put our vision of partnership into practice. Such partnerships are what we see in our past, hope for in our present and envision for our future.

In a Flint Journal report of remarks at the laying of the cornerstone of the parish house in 1916 St Paul's rector said, "This is going to be a large and well equipped building. It will be capable of giving us much pleasure. But God forbid that we of St. Paul's and our friends should use it in a selfish way, just for our own comfort and entertainment. No! We here and now dedicate it to the larger uses of the Kingdom of God and the needs of our city. Friends, one and all, the clergy of St. Paul's, the Vestry and the members of this church are your servants. This building is yours, not ours. Give us your kindly advice, sympathy and co-operation and demand of us an intelligent, sympathetic and earnest service."

As the parish considers the best way to make good use of our building in service to our neighbors, it's encouraging to see how we are carrying on the promise of our history. Of course we have assets to share, not in the sense of doing something

magnanimous or particularly generous, but rather of mutually sharing gifts in community with our neighbors. St Paul's is keenly aware of its history, and an important aspect of that history is thinking of our building as a missional asset that will serve our community through developing relationships that will meet common goals. The power of sharing relationships opens us up to new understandings of what our place is in the community and why we matter to our neighbors. Such a journey has much to teach us as we adapt and respond to the Spirit's promptings.

Each of us in the Partners group contributed to a strategic vision statement to guide our thinking about who we are and what we have to offer. It says:

St. Paul's, a parish that has been part of this city for generations, seeks to serve the greater Flint community at the intersection of civic and spiritual life. Seeing our parish building as a community asset, we seek to serve as a welcoming and safe space, providing a center for community to gather to grow together, in partnership with those who serve the common good. Nourished by diversity, we work together with our community across Flint and the region to further a world filled with those virtues Christ has taught us - compassion, solidarity, and social justice.

This statement speaks of rootedness in service to the greater Flint community, of partnership with others to serve the common good, of the values of inclusion and diversity of life experiences and insights, and of growth in compassion, solidarity and social justice as followers of Jesus Christ. It also honors the sense of our location, not only in the city, but also in the life of the greater Flint area at the intersection where civic and spiritual values and concerns meet. Where the statement is aspirational, it does not set goals that are beyond our reach. Rather it challenges us to become more fully what we have always been: a community of faith that is concerned about the needs of the world, and seeks partnerships which help us to respond to God's call to walk together in love, growing in abundant hope and faith as we learn from our journey together how best to make use of our assets for the common good, and so contribute to the building of the Kingdom that God had in mind when he first scooped up clay from the earth.

Plans from the Stewardship Ministry

According to the Episcopal Network for Stewardship: “We are children of God, disciples of Jesus Christ who feel called to a ministry of transformation through stewardship. We are sojourners who, along with many others, have some sense that it is through an understanding of holistic stewardship and a practice of gratitude and generosity that we will grow spiritually, that we will grow more and more into the likeness of the loving, generous God in whose image we are created. We believe that it is by virtue of our baptism that we are called to this ministry of stewardship.”

Healthy and vibrant future ministries in Episcopal congregations, schools, and other organizations will be built upon the legacies we leave today. Many of our Episcopal institutions exist because past generations cared so much about the future of the Episcopal Church and expressed their caring by creating planned gifts.

This is certainly the case with St. Paul’s Episcopal Church for the past 150 years.

To help us understand how St. Paul’s may fit into our own plans as individual members, the Stewardship Ministry is setting up two informational sessions about Planned Giving with experts in the charitable giving community. These sessions are completely optional, so feel free to stay in Barth Hall after the coffee hour and hear a presentation of no more than 20 minutes, with 10 additional minutes for your questions. If you don’t feel that this is right for you, please feel free to leave before the session starts.

THIS IS OPTIONAL.

The first session will be on Sunday, July 16, 2023 following the Coffee Hour. Present will be a staff member from our partner organization, The Community Foundation of Greater Flint. To be scheduled at a later date will be representatives from the Episcopal Church Foundation. Stay tuned for those details.

Peace, The Stewardship Ministry



Our generosity is informed by the simple theological truth that God has blessed us infinitely with all of the gifts of Creation. Our lives, our labor, our love is devoted to the mission of the Church when we take stock and realize that our lives and our response to God’s generosity are:

Rooted in Abundance.

Senior Warden Notes... Trust, Abundance, Fruit!

The Episcopal Network for Stewardship (TENS) is using this passage from Jeremiah as the basis for its 2023 campaign materials and slogan, "Rooted in Abundance".

"Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit." Jeremiah 17:7-8 NRSV

As I read this passage from Jeremiah, there are a few things that I think about:

We aren't told anything about who planted the tree! How did it end up by the water?

The tree, although planted by water, had to do something. It wasn't good enough to simply be there. The tree had to send out its roots, trusting the presence and abundance of the stream.

The tree is not anxious or fearful of its sometimes-inhospitable climate or seasonal changes. If it did not become anxious or fearful, what did the tree do?

The leaves of the tree stay green when the heat comes, and the tree doesn't cease to bear fruit during a drought.

Where do we see trust, abundance, and fruit in the life and work of St. Paul's?

Building Community

1. Our average Sunday attendance has consistently grown since the pandemic! Last week, 51 parishioners and visitors attended our 10AM service.
2. Our Wednesday 12:10PM mass (Worship and Liturgy) is growing! Last week there were 17 communicants, including a number of guests, who gathered for worship near the Columbarium!
3. Likewise, the Wednesday Book Study (Education Ministry) is growing! The group has grown from 3 members to 14! They have outgrown the confines of the library and now meets upstairs in the newly reconfigured 'Vestry/Conference Room'.
4. Glad Spirits Gardening Day/Group (Building and Grounds/Outreach) led our spring clean-up event, with 13 parishioners and visitors helping to tidy up the yard. The group is also consulting local gardeners to develop a plan and budget for ensuring our best stewardship of the yard and gardens.
5. Our first 'Video Night' was a huge success, with an audience of 15! The film in June was 'The Bible Tells Me So', and attendance far exceeded expectations. We plan to make this a regular activity.
6. St. Paul's was well-represented at Flint Pride (Diversity) with 18 volunteers working the St. Paul's table. It was a lovely day of celebration and fellowship!
7. In the last month, we have also been blessed to welcome literally hundreds of our neighbors into our abundant space!
 - Artwalk: 187 parishioners and visitors!
 - Broadway Bound Theater Rehearsals: 55 students from across Genesee and Lapeer Counties
 - Burton Senior Center - Church Tour: 16 members of the senior center.
 - Child Welfare Society - Regular Meeting

- Flint Residents for Stronger Neighborhoods: 20 Flint residents working to build community!
- Greater Flint Toast Masters
- Master Singers Rehearsal: 30 choir members
- Michigan State University Internship - Church Tour: 10 students and faculty members
- Pride Service (Diversity/Worship and Liturgy): St. Paul's welcomed 42 parishioners and neighbors into our space for our Second Annual Pride Service of Love.

St. Paul's Ministry Groups/Chaplains

As we focus on our ministry priorities and the work of each committee/ministry, my hope is that we will continue to find ways to collaborate, communicate, and share the fun with each other.

It is easy to get caught up in the urgency of the day, anxiously working to respond to each perceived need, issue, or idea that arises. My hope is that we can take time to consider our place and location, recognize the abundance around us, and grow in our relationships with each other, our ministries, and our community.

Tim Grant has long served as the 'chaplain' for the Stewardship Ministry. Each meeting begins with prayer, a reading from scripture, and 3 or 4 reflection questions. The practice has helped the group to avoid getting caught up in the perceived urgency of planning, problem-solving, and brainstorming. The process creates room for members to recognize and remember that we are rooted in indeed abundance!

I know that most ministry meetings already begin with prayer and scripture, but my hope is for each group to identify its own 'chaplain' to lend some consistency between the groups. Tim has offered to help or provide materials for anyone who might be interested in serving as a ministry chaplain.
