










### A Note from Tom

"A wrong attitude towards nature implies somewhere a wrong attitude towards God, and the consequence is an inevitable doom." \*

The words of T. S. Eliot ring more true today then when he wrote them. Natural disasters seem to dominate the news these days, with a terrible fire in <u>Lahaina</u>, Hawaii leading the headlines last week. Lahaina was once the royal residence of King Kamehameha, and it was the capital of Maui from 1820 to 1845. In California, Hurricane Hilary hit the southern coast while a 5.1 earthquake *simultaneously* slammed Los Angeles. Closer to home, Michiganders have dealt with the effects of the enormous Canadian wildfires. At the time of this writing, some 38 million acres have burned, an area nearly as large as the state of Georgia.

Wow.

Eliot continues: "For a long enough time, we have believed in nothing but the values arising in a mechanized, commercialized, urbanized way of life..."

Natural disasters are nothing new, and the ferocious power of nature has certainly been on display before. But now more than ever it feels to me like each natural disaster is a painful cry by the earth itself. It almost feels like earth is saying, "What must I do to get your attention?"

The earth itself is one of the many reasons I believe in God. When I look at our planet, I see *perfection*. I see a planet that is alive and beautiful. I see lakes and forests that inspire me. I see mountains and waterfalls that take my breath away. I see a world that is too perfect to have just *happened*. When I look at our planet, I see God.

"...it would be as well for us to face the permanent conditions upon which God allows us to live upon this earth."

I don't think there's much for me to add. If nothing else, I believe that our incredible string of recent natural disasters should wake us up to the gift from God that is our planet. Perhaps it's time that we stop taking this miracle for granted.

### **HOLLY'S NOTES**

It has been brought to my attention that September is used to celebrate Gospel Music. I looked at the website; <a href="https://nmaahc.si.edu/explore/stories/celebrating-black-music-month">https://nmaahc.si.edu/explore/stories/celebrating-black-music-month</a> and it gave the following definition of Gospel Music:

Sacred music, which includes spirituals and gospel music, illustrates the central role that music plays in African American spiritual and religious life. The earliest form of black musical expression in America, spirituals were based on Christian psalms and hymns and merged with African music styles and secular American music forms. Spirituals were originally an oral tradition and imparted Christian values while also defining the hardships of slavery. Gospel music originated in the black church and has become a globally recognized genre of popular music. In its earliest manifestations, gospel music functioned as an integral religious and ceremonial practice during worship services. Now, gospel music is also marketed commercially and draws on contemporary, secular sounds while still conveying spiritual and religious ideas.

This certainly fits into any definition I have used to explain what Gospel music is. I have done quite a bit of research into Fisk Jubilee Singers, which I have talked about before in my columns for the Epistle. As Americans, we should be so grateful to Fisk University and the foresight they had to write down what

had been an oral tradition and made spirituals and songs that were part of the African American life, available to all Americans.

Many of the songs in LEVAS are for this very purpose, to integrate American music into our services, and for us to benefit from the spiritualty of people who came before us. I am also changing our service music for September – November. It is new, and I hope that you will learn it to enhance our singing together, in worship.

"Steal Away" is one of my favorite spirituals. I think because in our innermost selves, the idea of seeking Jesus in the quiet of our lives, is so calming and necessary. It is not loud and boisterous; it is serene and sincere. The seeking of Jesus for help, solace, and peace is a necessary part of my life, I hope for yours as well. We are our true selves, when no one is watching, but God is always watching and seeking Him is a daily goal and provides peace, when nothing else does.

It was a great day to be on the intersection of Saginaw Street and Third Street - on the longest front yard downtown.


WE OPENED OUR DOORS. At 5:30 am today, we opened the front doors, the bath-room doors, and the sanctuary for blessings.

## CRIM DAY



### We heard from... The Rev. Michael Schulenberg

### Dear St. Paul's parish family,

I was hired way back in 1969 to be the Assistant to the Rector, The Rev. Franklin Bennett. My wife, Karen, and I and our infant son, David, arrived in late July to take up residence in northeast Flint and I started the process of learning how to be a parish priest. Franklin was a generous and patient mentor and I am forever blessed to start ministry under his tutelage. In August of 1970, I was asked to stay on as Rector of St. Paul's, succeeding Mr. Bennett as he retired due to health issues. I remained at St. Paul's until July 1 of 1980 when I left to be the Rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Aberdeen, South Dakota. Karen and I made two more moves over the years, to Christ Episcopal Church in Red Wing, Minnesota, and then in 1992 to Holy Cross Episcopal Church in Pensacola, Florida, where I remained until retiring in the end of 2002. All told, I was in parish ministry for almost 34 years.


The 70s were years of great change in the Episcopal Church nationally: the Book of Common Prayer was updated with new liturgies centering on the Eucharist as well as in a "modern" tongue; the Hymnal was updated with the addition of contemporary tunes; the ordination of women to the priesthood was achieved and soon thereafter the consecration to the office of Bishops followed. At each change, our St. Paul's family was stressed and challenged but came through, finally, still a body of faith that placed its values squarely on a loving Lord and a caring local witness in and to the heart of Flint. In those same years, an "eating together" noon meal was served to upwards of 100 people a day (mostly seniors) and, each Sunday one of the three priests that then served at St. Paul's made a trip to Mio, Michigan, to help a small "preaching station" grow into a diocesan mission. Both these outreach programs were achieved due to the generosity of the budget of St. Paul's and the continuing and committed theology of a Loving Lord.


The staff in those years numbered nine full-time people: three clergy, two secretaries, two sextons, one parish visitor mainly to serve the elderly, and a full-time organist and choir director. The budgets in those years also included trusts and legacies from St. Paul's early years that maintained the parochial missions of St. Christopher's Church in Burton Township and St. Bartholomew's Church, Swartz Creek (each with a full-time priest). It was a busy and vibrant time!

I am 82 years of age now. But people and families and events and stories abound in my memories. I am humbled and blest by the life of St. Paul's and the deep and abiding mark made upon my soul by all that transpired in this hallowed place. May all that is yet to come continue in the legacy and foundation laid so many, many years ago. May the 150<sup>th</sup> celebration be life-giving and faith-renewing in every possible way.















# MOVIE NIGHT



### SENIOR WARDEN'S NOTES

### **OUR HISTORY IS A GIFT!**

St. Paul's has been blessed with abundant gifts since the congregation first came together in the fall of 1839. Through the years, the parish has found ways to share these gifts with our friends and neighbors. This Sunday, we'll mark the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first service held in our magnificent church edifice at the intersection. Through the years, this iconic building has been an embassy of sorts. This historic intersection is where we welcome neighbors, and the place from which we reach out to engage and build community.

It might be a relatively simple exercise to point to the stone walls, the arched beams, and the stunning windows; and recognize this sacred space as a wonderfully precious gift. But, the stories of those who built this parish and this community are likewise among the precious gifts we've received, and joyfully share. We are the stewards of these stories, and our season of celebration has given us a wonderful vehicle to put our history to the best and highest purposes.

In the end, our 150<sup>th</sup> season of celebration has simply been a convenient vehicle, a tool, a gift for us to share. When the planning team first met, the only identified deliverable/goal, was 'Relationships'; and the only spoken strategy was 'Collaboration'. As our official celebration wraps up this Sunday, our challenge is to maintain, strengthen, and build our relationships with each other and our neighbors.

### **BUILDING COMMUNITY**

- 1. The partnership between St. Paul's and Family Promise has given us the opportunity to live into the promise of our work with Partners for Sacred Places. Family Promise has now moved their day program into the second-floor classrooms of the parish house. Many thanks to everyone who helped to make this possible. I'm particularly grateful for the tireless work of Barb and Ted Mannor, along with Bill Johnson.
- 2. Back to the Bricks was a HUGE success! The weather was fantastic, the crowd was unbelievable, and St. Paul's folks were front and center in helping to keep exhibitors and spectators well fed. Thanks to Velecia and her concessions team for the smiling faces and the long hours of preparation. Thanks as well to the indoors team for opening doors and welcoming neighbors in for a tour, a quiet moment, a chat, or maybe just a trip to the bathroom. Although we couldn't get an accurate count of visitors, estimates put the number somewhere between 300 and 400 friends that walked through those open doors.
- 3. Those of our members who watch social media have likely seen that some of our neighbors are sharing updates and posts about St. Paul's. Just this week, both the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) and the Genesee County Historical Society have featured stories about St. Paul's on their respective Facebook pages. Saginaw Street in the past few days, perhaps you should... and have a look at the digital bulletin board above the Flat Lot! St. Paul's and our Sunday 150<sup>th</sup> event are featured on this huge sign, which will be seen by tens of thousands of visitors, runners, and walkers as they toe the starting line for this Saturday's Crim Festival of Races.

### VESTRY LEADERS / STEWARDSHIP

- 1. This past week, each vestry leader received an invitation from the Stewardship ministry to go back to your respective groups and consider preparing an announcement for one of the Sundays during this year's pledge campaign. Father Tom has made time available during each of the 11 weeks (September 17-November 26) for the various ministries to share a 5 minute announcement about 'who they are, what they do, and what it means to the parish'. The invitations included a specific discussion guide to help the groups prepare for their identified week. While there is no requirement for anyone to participate, our hope is that each group will take advantage of the opportunity.
- 2. Joel Arnold and I have recently shared a conversation with Sarah Jones from Partners for Sacred Places. There were really three items on the agenda. First, we simply spent some time debriefing the conclusion of our first contracted services with Partners (Asset Mapping, Strategic Visioning). Sarah also shared some resources and materials that might be helpful in considering our next steps (See Attached), implementing our space sharing agreements, etc, and finally, early conversations about moving forward with the first steps in thinking about a potential capital campaign.

The first step in a thoughtful capital campaign, according to Partners, requires that we undertake what is called a 'Conditions Assessment', a process by which we engage an outside engineering firm to complete a thorough examination of our facilities, and help us to identify all of those areas (as desired or required) to be funded by a campaign.

Although there are no immediate plans for a campaign, the input from experts at Partners, and conversations with each ministry can help us to consider and prepare for our next steps.

3. Watch this space for information about our upcoming informational session on Planned Giving.

### St. Paul's Ministry Goals/Priorities

Our commitment to the diocese and our letter of agreement, signed when Father Tom joined us in April, included specific things to be defined, tracked, and accomplished during this next season of ministry. Although it is easy to focus on the urgent matters of daily operations, my hope is that our vestry can organize ourselves around these three 'Ministry Priorities'. As stated in our Letter of Agreement;

- a. Within the first year, <u>we</u> will identify the specific elements of its mission in this next season of ministry. The visioning process will also identify measurable steps to reach the overall goal.
- b. Following the identification of mission, we will live into that vision by working through the measurable steps identified. Yearly reviews will ensure that the process is on track.

c. St. Paul's-Flint will continue the work it has begun in building a deeper relationship with the community surrounding the church building.

As the vestry continues to focus and work on these ministry priorities, my hope is that we will all continue to find ways to collaborate, communicate, and share the fun with each other.

### **MINISTRY GROUPS - CHAPLAINS**

As the vestry discussed in June, we continue to move forward with encouraging each ministry group to identify one of their members to serve as the ministry chaplain. Tim Grant has long served as the 'chaplain' for the Stewardship Ministry. The benefit of Tim's work in this role has been profound. Tim's presence and leadership has helped the group to avoid getting caught up in the perceived urgency of planning, problem-solving, and brainstorming. The process creates room for members to recognize and remember that St. Paul's is like the tree planted by the water. Once your group has identified the member to serve as chaplain, it would be good to let me know so that we can share materials and resources.

Tim has agreed to take on the role of Chaplain for the vestry, and has also offered to help or provide materials for anyone who might be interested in serving as a ministry chaplain.


### PET BLESSING SERVICE SUNDAY OCTOBER 1ST


Join St. Paul's for our annual tradition of the Blessing of the Pets in honor of St. Francis of Assisi.


