A Note from Tom

'It's like deja vu all over again.'

So said the great New York Yankee, Yogi Bera. He had Mickey Mantle in mind when he said it, but he could have had the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Michigan in mind as well.

The recent resignation of Bishop Prince Singh is, however, no laughing matter. His departure throws into turmoil the effort to join our Diocese of Eastern Michigan with the Diocese of Western Michigan. Known as "juncture", the merger of the two Episcopal dioceses has been in the planning stages for some four years now. With a vote scheduled for March 2024, the departure of Bishop Singh seems like a cruel joke played on the Episcopalians of the State of Michigan.

But it's nothing new to us. Bishop Singh was our 5th bishop in 5 years. And whomever takes over—in 2024—will likely be our 6th bishop in 7 years. That's a lot of turmoil for us in Eastern Michigan.

And yet, because of that very turnover in the office of the bishop, I personally believe that our leadership is in good hands. The Standing Committee and the Diocesan Council of Eastern Michigan are used to "running things" in the absence of a bishop. They did it for an entire year in 2020 (during Covid) when Bishop Hougland was suspended. And those two leadership groups each feature a member of our own congregation. Jelecia Geraghty is a member of the Standing Committee and Elizabeth Jordan is a member of Diocesan Council. Furthermore, our diocesan staff is also strong. So I believe that the leadership of our diocese is in good hands, despite the absence of a bishop.

At our annual meeting in January, we will elect four delegates to the diocesan convention. These delegates will be representing St. Paul's and will be tasked with voting on Juncture. It is my hope and my prayer that the absence of a bishop does not impact our delegates' decisions.

Because we've seen this before.

It's like déjà vu all over again.
