#### A Note from Tom

"Lent is always so...miserable."

This off-handed comment was made by a colleague of mine recently. And while I don't take the remark too seriously (it wasn't intended that way), it occurs to me that it does speak a certain truth. Depending on how one looks at it, Lent *is* somewhat miserable. The themes of sin, penitence, sacrifice, and obedience—often associated with Lent—are not especially congenial. It's almost as if Lent intentionally veils the church in a dark, foreboding umbrella of oppression.

And then when Easter arrives, the cloud of doom is lifted. The church again seems bright and happy. Our attitudes are immediately repaired, and we can once again be joyful and enthusiastic. We have taken off the shoe that doesn't fit. Our relief is immediate.

If this sounds like a particularly dark assessment of Lent, then I agree. Lent need not be miserable. The glass need not be half-empty. Beauty, as the old saying goes, is in the eye of the beholder. And guess what? So is Lent.

Rather than looking at Lent as 40 days of agony, I prefer to look at it as 40 days of inspiration. Instead of focusing on our sins, for example, perhaps Lent could be a time when we focus on our achievements. Instead of dwelling on our own inadequacies, maybe we can dwell on our triumphs. Maybe instead of begging God to forgive **us**, we can seek to forgive others. And rather than *humbling* ourselves before God, we can achieve the things that will lift us **up** in the eyes of God.

There is no doubt that Lent is a special time of year for those of us who are committed followers of Christ. It is certainly a time of preparation for the celebration of the resurrection at Easter. And it is likewise true that our attitudes *should change* during Lent. But they should change for the better, not the worse. Lent should be a time of renewed Christian energy. A time when we see Jesus' forty days as the triumph that it was. And a time when we try as hard as we can to create our own triumph to the glory of our God.

So have a great Lent. Have a happy Lent. And, dare I say, have a fun Lent! With every blessing...

We are dedicating and naming the choir room in honor of long-time choir member, and in honor of Elizabeth Barnhart. Elizabeth was a member of the Chancel Choir of St. Paul's for over 50 years. Many of us remember the smile that she would greet us with that would light up her whole face. She was a faithful member, never missing a Sunday and sang 2<sup>nd</sup> Soprano. She was always kind and would help anyone who needed her. We honor her memory by naming the choir room after her. We will hold a naming ceremony after church March 17, please join us in the choir room after the 10:00 service.

The other important item for March is Easter! I was teaching my class about G. F. Handel and his oratorios that he wrote and remembered that our Chancel Choir will sing "Christ Has Risen" from <u>Judas Macabeus</u>. Judas Macabeus, was a <u>Jewish</u> priest. He led the <u>Maccabean Revolt</u> against the <u>Seleucid Empire</u> (167–160 BCE) and is also known for removing all of the statues depicting Greek gods and goddesses and purifying the temple in Jerusalem. #### **Did you know Elizabeth Barnhart?**

Elizabeth was a lifelong member at St. Paul's who passed away in July 2023. She was baptized here in 1949 and confirmed in 1950.

Elizabeth was born and lived her entire life in Flint. She attended Flint schools and the University of Michigan. She returned to Flint after college and began her teaching career at Beecher High School.



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Elizabeth was very active member of the church and served the church in many different ways. She was active in the choir for over 40 years, involved with the Altar Guild, Sunday school teacher, Lector, Eucharistic minister, Eucharistic visitor and many other ministries. She is remembered for her dry humor, smiling face and willingness to help others.

Elizabeth had great a love for St. Paul's and remembered St. Paul's at her passing by leaving her estate directly to St. Paul's. Her donation has been added to St. Paul's investment portfolio which benefits to St. Paul's in two ways. First, as with all of our investments, we take 4% each year to use directly in the annual budget and secondly, St. Paul's invests the principal and benefits from earnings for use in future years.

Because of her love of music and her generous financial gift, the music room in the lower level of the church will be re-named in her honor during March and her name will be put on the door. The funds from her donation will be directed toward the continuing operations of the choirs.

She will always be remembered for her dedication, care for others and her great love of St. Paul's. Our eternal thanks to Elizabeth for all her contributions.



# \*stations of the CROSS our Lenton Journey in 2024

Prayerful meditation through the Stations of the Cross has been a practice, each Friday during Lent, for several years at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. We have continued this tradition in 2024. We started on February 16, and will end on Good Friday, March 29.

Each Friday we will use a different version of the service, drawing on the beauty of the building, art, the symbols we find all around us, the work of our ministries, and an inclusion of our neighbors from our place at our intersection.

#### **FEBRUARY 16**

Traditional Stations of the Cross, Prayed for years by St. Paul's in the Sanctuary. Together we pray: We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you. Because by your holy cross, you have redeemed the world. Holy God, holy and mighty, holy immortal One, Have mercy upon us.

#### **FEBRUARY 23**

Henri Nouwen "Walk with Jesus" - Inspired by the drawings of Sister Helen David, Henri Nouwen sees in these images the ongoing passion of Christ in our world today. Stark and moving, her drawings -of an abandoned child, of a political prisoner behind bars, a peasant burdened by a load of firewood, a mother grieving for her murdered son-still do not lead us to despair. Rather, as Nouwen notes, they "help us unite our own broken humanity with the humanity of the men, women, and children portrayed."

#### MARCH 1

CROSS-WALK: Taking a journey through every corner of the church, just as Jesus took a journey to his death, we will stand at fifteen different crosses, and pray together: As we stand before this Cross in this space, 'What do we (Jesus) see?' 'What do we (Jesus) hear?' "How do we (Jesus) experience the Way of the Cross in this space at St. Paul's"

#### **MARCH 8**

COMMUNITY: 2nd FRIDAY ARTWALK: Working in collaboration - music and art. "Praying the Stations of the Cross, Finding Hope in a Weary Land", by Margaret Adams Parker and Katherine Sonderegger. From the book's introduction: "Suffering, sorrow, injustice, confusion, and death can touch any of us, at any time . . . the Stations can offer consolation and comfort when we are grieving; healing and restoration when we are parched; inspiration and guidance when we are searching or lost or simply beset by the turmoil and temptation, isolation and insecurity that unsettle all our lives."

#### **MARCH 15**



"Jesus and his cross are not something external to our lives, they are not an event that ended in the past, they must not be the object of our sentimental piety. Jesus does not invite us on the Way of the Cross to regret, but to change our mentality and our actions."*

#### **APPEARING MARCH 8**



Their goal is to introduce artistic concepts and techniques as a means of *connecting*, *expressing*, *learning* and *discovery*. They offer workshops in the visual arts, spoken word poetry, theatre, dance and yoga. Workshops take place inside the Genesee County Juvenile Justice Center (GCJJC) and at the Learning Co-op in Flint, Michigan.

Hello, Everyone.

We have another scheduled Blood Drive coming up on April 12, Friday.

Although the time is not precisely determined yet, I am hoping that people who work that day may be able to come to donate in the late afternoon.

One can donate blood every 8 weeks, 56 days, and thus, even if you had donated in January (Thank you!), you can donate again in April.

Please drink a lot before you donate, that would make your vein plump, and it makes it easier to access.

Blood supply is very short lately, and therefore I hope every eligible person can come out and donate.

Though actual blood drawing takes only 9-10 minutes, initial screening and preparation of bags and tubes take a longer time. And thus please allow one hour for this purpose.
