A Note from Tom

Last month was Women's History Month. I would never have known of Women's History month were it not for the St. Paul's Diversity Committee...

As luck would have it, I happened to read an article recently by a bishop of the Anglican Church of North America, sometimes referred to as the ACNA. The ACNA was founded in 2009 by former members of the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Church of Canada who were dissatisfied with the social teachings in their former churches, particularly the welcoming of LGBTQ members. It should be noted that the ACNA is not a member province of the world-wide Anglican Communion.

The name of the bishop who wrote the article is Chris Warner. The title of the article is *Blessed is the Fruit of your Womb*. The topic: abortion.

Now to be fair, much of the article was reasonable. Bishop Warner described his wife's pregnancy with his first child. He discussed how he prayed for the unborn baby and felt the baby kick. He mentioned the story (from the Gospel of Luke) of the cousins Mary and Elizabeth, recalling that the unborn baby (John the Baptist) "leaped" in Elizabeth's womb at the sound of Mary's voice.

But then Bishop Warner wrote this: "Now we live in a culture that says the unborn are not alive."

Not alive?

In my mind, Bishop Warner's anti-abortion essay broke down at this point. I do not believe—nor have I ever—that an unborn fetus is not alive. Furthermore, I can also say that it would be my wish that every expectant mother *chooses* to carry her unborn baby to full term. But therein lies the problem. Anti-abortion rhetoric focuses only on the unborn baby. It consistently stops at the baby while quietly discriminating against the mother.

Because laws that prohibit abortion simultaneously subordinate women. Taking away a woman's right to make decisions regarding her own healthcare excludes women from social equality. Simply put, banning abortions puts women down.

I believe, as Bishop Warner writes, that "life is precious". But this includes the mother's life. "Abortion" is an ugly word, but it is no less ugly than "discrimination". Laws that prohibit abortion promote discrimination.

Thank God for Women's History Month.

HOLLY'S NOTES

April 7 the Chancel Choir will sing "Like the murmur of the dove's song." As a child when I stayed the night with my grandparents I would hear the comforting murmur of the dove at their house. It was always comforting and peaceful and that is what this hymn reminds me of. Peace and contentment that all things will work out. Even though lives often seem to be in turmoil, God is ever present and sends the Holy Spirit to comfort and give peace.

This was written by Carl Daw, Jr for our hymnal. I found the following information on hymnolgy.hymnsam.co.uk

Like the murmur of the dove's song. Carl P. Daw, Jr.* (1944-). Written for H82 at the request of the texts committee. It was written to fit the tune BRIDEGROOM by Peter Cutts*. Daw has noted that the opening line comes from an observation in Religion in Our Time by Louis Evely (New York, 1968): 'the image of the dove was chosen not because of the shape of the bird, but because of the moan. The dove murmurs all the time.' The hymn then uses the traditional Pentecostal imagery of wind and flame. The second stanza prays for the Holy Spirit to come to 'the members of Christ's body', the Church, and the third is concerned with the benefits of the Holy Spirit, the healing of division, love.

The words are as follows:

Like the murmur of the dove's song, like the challenge of her flight, like the vigor of the wind's rush, like the new flame's eager might: come, Holy Spirit, come.

To the members of Christ's Body, to the branches of the Vine, to the Church in faith assembled, to her midst as gift and sign: come, Holy Spirit, come.

With the healing of division, with the ceaseless voice of prayer, with the power to love and witness, with the peace beyond compare: come, Holy Spirit, come.

It is a beautiful song and I hope it will speak to you.






ART WALK


Participate in Episcopal 101 - The College for Congregational Development at St. Paul's Episcopal Church!
