A Note from Tom

I recently saw a new lapel pin being developed ahead of this month's General Convention in Louisville, KY. The pin reads, "The Episcopal Diocese of the Great Lakes, charting new waters October 2024". The words are inscribed over rolling waves:



This month's convention is shaping up to be an historic occasion for the Episcopal Church. First, the juncture of our two dioceses will (likely) be approved and our seven-year journey will finally be completed (technically, we will not become a new diocese until our diocesan convention in Mt. Pleasant in October). Second, we will be electing a new presiding bishop. Bishop Michael Curry's nine-year term will conclude, and one of five candidates will be elected. Although it saddens me to see Bishop Curry retire, it is very much in keeping with our church's governance, founded by the same principles as our own American Government. Third, there will be a contested election for the president of the House of Deputies. This is unusual as incumbent presidents are normally re-elected without opposition.

And St. Paul's will be well-represented at this year's convention. Elizabeth Jordan and I will both serve as deputies to the convention. TaMara Oertel will be in attendance as a winner of the National Altar Guild Association scholarship (see p 7), and Erynn Ford will be attending a youth mission trip to Louisville during convention week.

But it will be a bittersweet convention for sure, for as we say hello to a new Episcopal diocese, we will also say goodbye to Bishop Curry, who will surely go down in history among the finest of American preachers. I close therefore, with what is perhaps his most memorable line:

We must discover the power of love, the redemptive power of love, and when we do that we will make of this old world...a new world.

MUSICAL PERFORMANCE

Rubato was formed in 2019 and is dedicated to entertaining and educating audiences on a wide variety of music from all genres. In addition to performing existing works and commissioning new repertoire for their unique ensemble, the trio also transcribes and arranges works written for other instruments to perform. Rubato's repertoire ranges from jazz to classical to music of other cultures and modern works, and their performances are infused with musicality, expressive playing and energy. The joy the musicians get from making music together is reflected through their conversational music style and interactive playing, which engages audiences of all ages.

Rubato founding member, flutist and Artistic Director **Mary Procopio** has been an active performer, educator, clinician and adjudicator throughout Michigan and New York. She was flutist, founder, and Artistic Director of the *London Trio*, a group that performed throughout Michigan as part of the Michigan Arts and Humanities Touring Program,

Saxophonist **Dirk Nieuwenhuis** has been an active performer throughout Michigan as a soloist and ensemble member in both jazz and classical ensembles. His jazz trio, *Moments Notice*, played throughout the Greater Flint area for various jazz and community events.

Pianist **Pat Cronley** joined *Rubato* in 2022 and has been a professional musician since age sixteen. While in high school Pat studied piano with Larry MacDonald, and credits that experience as the most influential of his musical career. While his main focus is jazz, Pat's unique pianistic approach lends itself to many styles.

Capital Campaign

As many of you may know, the vestry has begun work on a Capital Campaign. We have been struggling with an old heating and cooling system that no longer can be maintained with repairs. Goyette Mechanical Co. has been trying to keep the old system functioning but it is becoming more difficult and they have advised us to think about a replacement.

When considering a capital campaign, you first need to establish a committee. Members of the congregation have applied to be part of this work. The vestry has approved the following members; George Gibson and Barbara Mannor as co-chairs, Joel Arnold, Becky Bennett, Jan Bugbee, John Cherry, Maggie Hart, TaMara Oertel.

Next we need to have someone to guide us in undertaking a feasibility study and connecting with the Flint community for funding. The committee is looking at a possible candidate for this role. We also will be contacting architectural firms for a building assessment.

This evaluation will address structural needs as well as energy efficient systems to heat and cool the building. We then will be able to establish the monetary goal for the campaign.

What can I do as a parishioner? First thing is your prayers. We are undertaking a journey that is unfolding as we move forward. We need the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Please ask questions so you can be supportive of this project. Besides the amount that the congregation raises, we will be looking for grants and outside organizations to help with the funding. As we continue to look for ways to serve the Flint community, we want to have a safe and functional building for our guests.

In the next few weeks, St Paul's members will be asked for suggestions of things you think should be included in the campaign. The committee envisions a plan for St Paul's vitality by looking at projects that we need to address now and in the future.

As we say in the post communion prayer, Father, send us out to do the work you have given us to do, to love and serve you as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord with gladness and singleness of heart. Amen

Vestry Announcement



We congratulate Tom and look forward to working together in the future for St. Paul's.






