



A Note from Tom

"Everyone wants a revolution, but no one wants to do the dishes."

In his acceptance speech to the House of Deputies, the Right Reverend Sean Rowe began with these well -known words often attributed to Dorothy Day. His speech acknowledged some of the challenges facing The Episcopal Church in 2024. Membership decline, diocesan financial struggles, and diminished congregational vitality are but a few of the problems of our church. Bishop Rowe suggested that some aspects of churchwide governance and structure could be preventing the church from adapting to a changing world.

"It's not too strong to say we're facing an existential crisis," Rowe said – not because the church doesn't have something to offer the world, but "because the world around us is changed and continues to change and is changing all the time. God is calling us ever more deeply into the unknown."

And so, with the first-ballot election of Bishop Rowe, the Episcopal church can, I think, look forward to an innovative leadership style.



Bishop Rowe, now Presiding Bishop-elect Rowe, will take office on November 1st, and his formal installation will occur on November 2.

Bishop Rowe has been the Bishop of the Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania since 2007. He also serves as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Western New York (through a partnership the dioceses established in 2019). It was in this "two-diocesan" capacity that he visited the Diocese of Eastern Michigan a few years ago. He came to Midland to discuss the challenges faced by the church right now. I found his address to us that day to be eloquent, imaginative, and interesting.

And he's right. We definitely need a revolution in our church if we are to stay relevant. But someone will have to do the dirty work, the work that requires a person to roll up their sleeves. And that someone...is us.

"It's time to reorient our church..." said Bishop Rowe. And make no mistake, he is the right man for the job.

We spent 22 hours in rehearsal for the Evensong we sang Friday evening and for the Holy Eucharist Sunday, July 14. Eight hours were spent in church services held everyday, starting with an Evensong Monday, July 8 and ending with the service Sunday morning. There was an organ concert Tuesday evening, and there were workshops on conducting, and newly published music. There is a priest on staff who makes time for us to consult with privately. 

THOUGHTS FROM THE OLD CELT

Welcome to Lughnasa (loon-us-suh). For the next few Epistles, we'll cover the Celtic calendar. The Milesians (early Celts) divided the year into four parts - a lunar calendar.

We begin our discussion with Lughnasa, from August 1st through October 31st. In the next issue, we will cover in detail the four periods of the year that were in use BCE, and how these periods incorporated Christian Saints in Ireland in the earlier years of the Common Era.

For now briefly, the Celtic calendar comprised:

Lughnasa - August 1 through October 31st, pronounced loon-uh-suh

Samhain - November 1st through January 31 pronounced sow-en

Imbolc - February 1 through April 30 pronounced im-ulk

Beltane - May 1 through July 31 pronounced bell-tane

Spring equinox

Summer solstice Winter solstice

Autumn equinox

We need to recall the summer and winter solstices, and the spring and autumn equinoxes.

In this way the Celtic seasons were seen before the coming of Christ. Early Celtic Christians began to see the four stations of the sun in relation to what they knew as the two main figures of Christianity, Christ and John the Baptist.

They began with John being six months older than Christ. While the dates today don't quite match their system, we have John being born on the summer solstice (June 24th) when the sun begins to decrease its presence and the days grow shorter and darker.

Six months later we have Christ's Nativity on the winter solstice as the days began to grow brighter and longer. Think of all the language through the years - "the light of Christ, " "God's true light," Glory be to God who has shown us the light from;

Benedictine Morning Prayer

Glory be to God who has show us the light! Lead me from darkness to light, Lead me from sadness to joy, Lead me from death to immortality, Glory be to God who has shown us the light.

By Counting backward from the birth of Christ we count 3 months to the autumn equinox, another three months to the spring equinox and the conception of Jesus. We now know this as the Feast of Annunciation.

We will follow the same method with St. John, and other saints as we continue through our four periods in coming issues. We'll also describe how the Irish Celtic Christians developed the Confession, as we know it today, and other contributions to the practices of our faith.
