2025 Proposed By-Law Amendments

All have been approved by vestry to be brought forward for vote at annual meeting.

- Move to approve a motion to amend Article IV Section 4 of the St. Paul's By-laws to read "(b). The Vestry shall also elect a Parish Treasurer and may appoint a Secretary, a chaplain, and such other agents as may be required at their discretion, who need not be members of the Vestry.." This amendment shall take immediate effect.
- Move to approve a motion to amend Article II Section 1 of the St. Paul's By-laws to read (b,1,b). "Delegates and Alternates – At the Annual Parish Meeting, four (4) three (3) Delegates and four (4) three (3) Alternate Delegates to the Diocesan Convention shall be elected."
- Move to approve a motion to amend Article II Section 1 of the St. Paul's By-laws to read (c,4). "Delegates and alternates to Diocesan Convention shall be elected by plurality vote with the highest four three vote recipients elected as delegates and the next four three elected as alternates."

Rationale/Explanation

- 1. Adding the position of vestry **chaplain** to the by-laws helps establish the legitimacy of the position and the expectation that the vestry will always have a spiritual presence (other than the rector).
- 2. When the Episcopal Dioceses of Eastern and Western Michigan merged to form the Episcopal Diocese of the Great Lakes in 2024, the number of delegates was reduced from 4 to 3.
- 3. See #2 (above).

Candidates for Vestry

Rebecca Bennett

St. Paul's Episcopal Church Annual Meeting January 21, 2024

Following our regular 10:00 service St. Paul's 2024 Annual meeting was held in Barth Hall after a brief but delicious luncheon.

At 11:50 Father Tom Manney called our 2024 Annual Meeting to order with explanation of how the meeting would be conducted. Attendance was by sign in sheet and 44 parishioners were present.

First on the agenda was a big Thank You to Heather Gagnon for providing our luncheon.

Next Fr. Tom gave a prayer for guidance, wisdom and thanks.

Appointments were made to select: Jan Bugbee Secretary of meeting

Tina Morrison and Celeste Lord-Timlin as tellers

Vote was taken and appointments were affirmed by affirmation.

Our next order of business: 2024 Proposed By-Law Amendments

Move to approve a motion to amend Article IV Section 1 of the St. Paul's By-Laws to read "The Vestry shall me made up of seven (7) members." This amendment shall take immediate effect

Move to approve a motion to amend Article IV Section 2 of the St. Paul's By-Laws to read "The terms of office of Vestry members shall be three (3) years, and the Vestry shall be divided into three (3) equal (or near equal) classes, one class leaving office each year.

Motion by Fr. Tom Manney. Supported by Ed Walthers. Affirmed by acclimation

Move to approve to amend Article II Section 1 Clause C line 4 to be thus changed.

From: "to be elected, a Nominee must be voted for on a majority of the ballots case. However, if it appears the election cannot be determined by majority vote, the Annual Parish Meeting may, by majority vote, decide that elections will be carried by plurality vote."

To: "To be elected, a vestry Nominee must be voted for on a majority of the ballots cast. If a vote results in no candidate (or not enough candidates) receiving a majority, then additional votes will be conducted with either those having already received a majority or the candidate with the least number of votes on the previous ballot removed from the ballot. Delegates and alternates to Diocesan Convention shall be elected by plurality vote with the highest four vote recipients elected as delegates and the next four elected as alternates."

Motion by Ed Walthers. Supported by Jelecia Geraghty.

At this time Fr. Tom explained the voting processes of both Vestry and Diocesan Convention and ballots were filled out by parishioners and collected by tellers. Tellers when retired to the library to process with the counts.

In the meantime:

Motion by Ed Walthers to accept the minutes from 2023 Annual Meeting. Tom Shriver supported the motion. Correction of the spelling of Karen Schafers name was included in the motion. Affirmed by acclimation of parish.

Next on the agenda was report given by George Gibson, Finance Director highlights as follows:

Pledges were down from last year and closing out the budget for 2023 we were approximately \$51,000 less than budgeted. The recommendations for upcoming 2024 is to increase our pledges and cut spending as much as possible.

<u>Motion by Don Standly to accept the Finance Report as given. Supported</u> by Ken Bugbee. Affirmed by acclimation of parish.

Reports were next:

Priest-In- Charge, Fr. Tom Manney:

Recognition of all staff was given and a round of applause followed. All the volunteers were recognized and thanked for all the work they do in the church. He spoke of the Arrival of Genesee Health Services to use space in our facility, and the Family Promise use of our rooms upstairs. Movie night expansion "not just movies" and Quiet Time. Purchase of new vestments, building maintenance, taking on the flower fund, but most of all the Vision of spiritual and community life in our church building.

During his report Karen Schafer asked for an explanation of the services given by GHS and Joel Arnold answered about the grief, LGBT community, and mental health meetings.

Audrey Stevens asked if these organizations were renting the use of the building and Fr. Tom explained that they were.

The Kaleidoscope educational plan including Becky Bennett, Tom Shriver, Mike Farver and Lanie Nicks.

Senior Warden, Walt Peake

Walt gave gratitude and thanks all around for the work on all committee work and shared accomplishment. Welcoming neighbors like Family Promise, all the work done for the 150 Year at this local, a new dishwasher in the Barth Hall Kiitchen but most of all the work done by our Search Committee in bringing Fr. Tom Manney as our Priest-in-Charge.

Junior Warden report, Elizabeth Jorden

Elizabeth gave a very short but wonderful speech to the fact that the Building and Grounds work done this year was done by a group of very dedicated people and that she was most

reliant on Becky Bennett for her help in doing the much appreciated work as building and grounds leader. She asked for and received a rousing round of applause.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church 2024 Annual Meeting Financial Highlights

Operating results for the year were better than budget

Actual deficit (loss) of \$16,000 compared to a budgeted deficit (loss) of \$111,000. This was offset by surplus revenue from prior years.

Main reason – additional non-budgeted revenue from various from Barth Trusts of \$59,000.

Revenue for 2024 was \$626,000 vs Budget of \$647,000

Sources of revenue:

- 1. Pledges \$167,000 or 27% of revenue
- 2. Distributions from Barth Trusts \$226,000 or 36%
- 3. Endowment Funds withdrawal \$139,000 or 22%
- 4. Ingalls Trust/Lile Music Trust/Other \$94,000 of 15%.

Expenses for 2024 were \$626,000 versus budget of \$647,000.

Largest expenses in 2024 were:

- 1. Personnel costs including benefits of \$336,000 vs budget of \$336,000
- 2. Building and Grounds total \$142,000 -Property/liability insurance \$48,000
 -Heating/cooling - \$48,000
 -building maintenance - \$70,000
- 3. Outreach \$132,000 vs budget of \$153,000 Beneficiaries include:

-Crossover \$9,000

-St. Andrews Episcopal Church \$27,000

- -Family Promise \$3,000
- 4. Administrative \$64,000

My Dear Friends,

I would first thank you all for installing me as Rector, and for conducting the most beautiful installation service that anyone could ask for. I will always be grateful for the opportunity to serve such a talented, loving congregation.

Here are a few highlighted areas of accomplishment in no particular order.

Church Attendance

Our attendance at regularly scheduled, Sunday services has increased! Here are the attendance figures:

<u>Year Total Average</u> 2024 3452 66.4 2023 3101 59.6

In addition to traditional Sunday attendance, in 2024 we began to record attendance at non-liturgical activities. This number was estimated at over 10,000.

And it should also be noted that there are many ways that a church can grow beyond attendance. A church can grow in outreach, in community relationships, in its spirituality, etc. While it is a wonderful thing to be able to celebrate church growth, to limit ourselves to attendance does not due justice to all the other ways churches can grow.

New Outdoor Signs

Although it ended up taking most of the year, we have finally replaced our monument signs located in front of the church and in the rear parking lot. We have also added signs at each of our Saginaw Street doors, a "main entrance" sign outside Barth Hall, and the replacement of one of our parking lot signs. The new signs are brighter and feature our new church logo as well as the logo of the national church. The process turned out to be quite lengthy with much vestry discussion, a parish-wide vote, permission from the Flint Planning and Zoning Department, and the Flint Historic District Commission (special thanks to TaMara Oertel and Joel Arnold who attended the Historic District Commission's meeting to argue for approval).

These signs are only Phase I of the total project. Phase II will consist of the replacement of parking lot signs and the addition of several others.

GHS Trans Support Group

Another cool thing that occurred in 2024 is the establishment of a Trans Support Group administered by the Genesee Health System. This group—that meets bi-weekly at St. Paul's—represents our commitment to support those who are the victims of severe discrimination. St. Paul's also hosted our annual Transgender Day of Remembrance service, this year in ecumenical fashion, partnering with the People's Church of Flint.

The Capital Campaign

2024 also saw the launching of a capital campaign. We hired a consultant—Linda Moxam—and did a great deal of planning and organizing relative to the campaign. Our building is in great need of updating—particularly the heating and cooling system, the "new" part of which is 40+ years old. Other updates considered include the church windows, the organ, the children's bathrooms upstairs, the bell tower (and support of the original church bell), the sealcoating of the parking lots, and the list goes on and on.

Blood Drives

St. Paul's has become a full-fledged blood drive location. We now host an average of four blood drives a year thanks to the inspiration and leadership of Dr. Susumu Inoue. And unlike going to the Red Cross Donation Center, donating at St. Paul's is also a fun social event with lots of fellowship and juice and cookies!

In Conclusion

To be honest, we do so much at St. Paul's that it is very difficult to keep track of it all. And I am really proud of all that we do. It makes us, in my opinion, an exceptional church. So many things we do are the direct result of the hard work of the various members of our congregation. When you put all our people together, the result is the most active and inspiring church I've ever seen.

Senior Warden's Report 2024

The Vestry began the year with a retreat at Camp Copniconic, to pray and set goals for 2024. I'm happy to report many of those goals were met. The goals were:

• Increase facility use - we have multiple groups using space for everything from Trans support and Family Promise to U of M choirs singing in our glorious sanctuary each December.

• Update signage - In February the congregation reached consensus on a design. Joel and I attended a meeting of the Historical commission to request approval of said sign and were approved. These signs were recently installed.

• Goal - use of the middle office and find a person to coordinate an outreach to the community -referring to appropriate agencies for those in need. Rayna Hauter is doing a stand up job in developing this program.

• Goal - Expand Children's ministry. Thank you to Barb Mannor for making this happen.

• Ministries to colleges in area - we were not as successful in reaching this particular goal, but it gives us something to work toward.

• CAP Campaign - full report from Linda Moxam

Beyond the goals set and reached, additionally, in March we discussed updating our mixing board to improve and increase the quality and capacity of our online presence. This was implemented in May.

Episcopal Kalidescope began once a month gatherings. This is an outgrowth of the College of Congregational Development's ministry.

We had 3 parishioners take part in a Diocesan discernment weekend. We now have one candidate in the process of Discernment.

In April we had our first Peace Vigil.

We had 3 parishioners take and accomplish a Preaching Course.

In June we began the use of our new communion rail, making reception of the Sacrament available standing or kneeling.

We celebrated Pride month and had a booth at the Junteenth festival. We celebrated our graduates. Also this summer was General Congregation in Louisville, KY. Attending were Fr. Tom and Elizabeth Jordan. Concurrently TaMara Oertel was a scholarship recipient of the National Altar Guild Association Triannual meeting.

In September we had a celebration of ministry as we officially welcomed Tom as Rector.

In October at Diocesan Convention we officially voted to be The Episcopal Diocese of the Great Lakes.

We had another peace vigil.

In November we had our Trans Day of Remembrance.

And finally in December after months of consideration Vestry approved a one year contract with the Crim Foundation to use one parking spot in the lot near Harrison St. (more info about this from Joel Arnold; Junior Warden.)

A busy year of growth and learning. Many thanks to the staff that keep things running smoothly, my fellow-Vestry members and Fr. Tom. It is a privilege to serve.

As we continue to think about how to open doors, share gifts, welcome neighbors, and build community, I am so happy to see our church used so regularly by so many partners, from New Century Chorale to Family Promise, Flint Residents for Stronger Neighborhoods to the Genesee Health System, Buckham Alley Theatre, the Red Cross, and so many more. As our Rector J Bradford Pengelly said in 1916, "We here and now dedicate [St. Paul's] to the larger uses of the Kingdom of God and the needs of our city....This building is yours not ours. Give us your kindly advice, sympathy, and co-operation and demand of us an intelligent, sympathetic, and earnest service." I believe we are truly living into that earnest service in our work.

One exciting partnership that was recently agreed to by our vestry is a lease with our friends at the Crim Fitness Foundation for two underutilized parking spaces in our rear parking lot for a small facility that will house items from their Better Block program. Better Block is a program that educates, equips, and empowers communities and their leaders to reshape and reactivate built environments to promote the growth of healthy and vibrant neighborhoods. At the Crim they are working to hold events in every ward of Flint to reimagine how we use our land and how to rebuild the healthy, vibrant, walkable neighborhoods that were once so common in our city. The Crim will store small items here like tables and chairs that will be used for community events across Flint and is willing to partner with St. Paul's to co-host events at the church's discretion in our own space to welcome neighbors and provide opportunities for meaningful gathering. These events function as popup recreations of the walkable, urban spaces that are so loved in cities around the nation and world.

Annual Meeting Report for 2024 from the Music Department

Music is an important part of our corporate worship services. We strive to bring music to the congregation that lifts up the soul and heart to praise and worship Christ. Everything the congregation hears on Sunday has been practiced, and gone over, and rehearsed as much as is humanly possible. I chose music for services that go with the liturgy for that day, season and or event. Music is chosen purposefully with the hope that we sing your personal favorite sometime during the year. Anyone is welcome to join in our choirs, if you do not know how to sing, or haven't sung in a choir before, we will teach you, kindly, and we want you to be a part of our groups.

During the year Chancel Choir sang for 40 different services. We had some guest artists who sang/played for us last summer. The Gospel choir, under the direction of Rafael McDaniel-Walker sang for 14 different services and traveled to Alpena in September and held concerts and participated in their service on Sunday. The Hand Bell Choir expanded to 3 octaves this fall and they played for 9 services, participated in the Peggy Ring and played at Crossroads Village as part of the Christmas celebration at Cross Roads.

The hand bells were refurbished and retuned during the 2024 summer months. They were worked on by a local person at Wind Works in Burton. It saves us on shipping and time when we support local businesses.

Music in the Heart of the City, our concert series continued and we have seen new people at those community outreach concerts.

New Century Chorale uses our building on Mondays from September - May and hold their concerts here, also as community outreach. It is a 35-voice choir and they come from all over Genesee and Lapeer counties to practice every week in our facility.

We also hosted Powers Catholic High School choir invitational in March, which we will do again this year. This involves 4 area high school choirs as a festival alternative.

U of M and Mott Community College used our building for concerts this past year for concert events.

If you are asking why we encourage the community to use our building - St. Paul's has always participated in local events. The acoustics in our nave are particularly lovely for music events. We have been gifted wonderful instruments, the Dalton Organ - maintained by our organist, Mr. Ed Arter, and the Colton Piano - maintained by Denis Ikeler. It is only right that we share our wonderful facilities with the community around us.

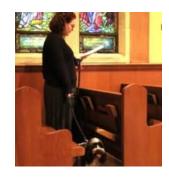
2024 HIGHLIGHTS: COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY

Community Engagement

St. Paul's has a long and wonderful history of innovation, collaboration, engagement, and important contributions to the 'welfare of the city'. The parish has historically served as a sort of hub, with spokes reaching out into the social, industrial, cultural, and civic life and work of our community. We are the beneficiary of the work done by those who came before us, and the stewards of the gifts that have been left to our care. The history of Flint and Genesee County simply could not be told without mention of the role that the men and women of St. Paul's. From the start, almost 200 years ago, our work of 'Seeking the welfare of the City', has always led us to find new ways to open doors, welcome neighbors, share gifts, and build community. Community engagement is nothing new to the parish.

A few years ago, as an outgrowth of our Stewardship ministry, we organized a workgroup to sponsor a celebration of the 150th anniversary of the opening of our church building at the intersection of S. Saginaw Street and E. Third Street. The project afforded an opportunity to take an intentional look at where and how community engagement has helped sustain and grow the parish. We recognized early on, that building blocks of engagement have most often been relationships, collaboration, and showing up.

It is easy to point to parish events, functions, and activities, as examples of 'engagement'. A quick scroll through the parish calendar for 2024 is an easy way to see those 'examples'. But perhaps it would be more helpful to think of these events and functions not as examples but as evidence, the fruit of the less obvious work of meeting new people, making new friends, and finding opportunities to collaborate with our neighbors and friends. I'll leave it to others to

highlight specific events that reflect their work or the work of their various committees/ministries.

Going into a new year, my hope is that each of us will consider how our own community engagement, relationships, and collaborations are gifts to be shared. Being sent to do the work that we've been given to do, we are blessed to have men and women in the parish who volunteer or work for the welfare of the city, others sit on boards, hold public office, join clubs, or support our local businesses. Although it isn't always obvious, and we may not typically think of it in these terms, the real work of community engagement is what we do as we go about our daily lives.
