

A Note from Tom

This month, I have decided to do something of a smorgasbord of topics about which I would like to share a few thoughts:

Pope Leo: I was, as I told several people, amazed at the election of an American Pope. *Never*, in my lifetime, did I expect to see a Pope with not only American Heritage, but *Michigan* heritage (Pope Leo attended high school in western Michigan, at the now-closed St. Augustine Seminary High School in Holland) as well. But I was further surprised that the 267th pope, the former Cardinal Robert F. Prevost, has Black family roots in New Orleans, Louisiana. Both of Leo XIV's maternal grandparents are described as Black or mulatto in several census documents. "It's clear," said one genealogist, "that the Pope has centuries-long ties to free people of color in Louisiana." Pretty cool.

Murder of Minnesota Legislators: It was with great sorrow that I read of the stalking and murdering Minnesota House of Representatives Speaker Emerita Melissa Hortman and her husband, in addition to stalking and shooting Minnesota State Senator John Hoffman and his wife. In response to the violence, The Rev. Rev. Craig J. Loya, Bishop of Minnesota, shared these words:

As Christians, we proclaim as Lord the one who met a murderous and vindictive empire, not with retributive or self-protective violence, but with immovable love. That love, though he died for it, was not a passive resignation to evil, but a refusal to engage it on its own terms.

Bombing of Iran: The president's decision to bomb three Nuclear facilities in Iran while Iran is in the midst of a war with Israel means that the war is being expanded. One might ask—as several polls have already—whether to support this decision or not. My reaction is the same, I support peace. Rather than picking sides between combatants, or picking sides of a decision, I always support peace because, I firmly believe, there is no room for war in the Christian faith.

Independence Day: As we approach the July 4th holiday, I would urge that we all celebrate our country's history. The Founding Fathers were in many ways like we are today. They were, first of all, *divided*. Some, but not all, supported the independence movement, while others sought the political freedoms they felt were granted by God. Second, the Founding Fathers were *visionaries*. They saw the country, not for its flaws, but for its possibilities. Third, the Founding Fathers were brave. In the face of a short-sighted and contemptuous *king*, they put their lives quite literally at risk, as they took the bold steps necessary to effect real and lasting change. Said Benjamin Franklin at the signing of the Declaration, "we must all hang together, or most assuredly we shall all hang separately."

I wish you all a peaceful and relaxing July. May God bless us, ourselves and our ministries, and our country.

Featured Artist: Sam Selou, Abstract Impressions

My name is Sam Selou. I was born in Nineveh, Iraq and grew up in Baghdad. I left Iraq in 1977 and followed my passion for art to Europe. Later, I immigrated to the United States to seek a better future. I arrived in the United States in 1979 and my dream was to go to art school. Although I wasn't well-versed in English, I was able to attend Mott Community College in Flint, Michigan, and I especially enjoyed painting and sculpture. I received a great amount of satisfaction being able to continue my dream in this country's wonderful institutions.

One of my highest achievements was sculpting a full-sized statue of William Ballenger, who was one of the founders of The Buick Company. Mr. Ballenger did many great things for his community, and this statue now appears in Ballenger Park. I also produced a statue for the Catholic Church in Detroit to honor one of the Saints. In addition to that, I created two sculptures of ancient Babylonian Art permanently displayed in the Chaldean Cultural Center located at Shenandoah Country Club in West Bloomfield, MI. One example of my published work is featured in the book The Flint Sit-Down Strike of 1936-1937: Witnesses and Warriors. There are also large private collections in several private buyers' homes.

Currently, I paint, sculpt, and work producing abstract wood-working sculptures. I've had multiple showings in various art galleries throughout the United States. I have lived in the Flint area for over 40 years and continue to work to improve my art, and to serve the community.

Featured Musician: Jasmine Turman, Vocalist

Jasmine Turman is currently a Sophomore at Mott Community College. She is a vocal performance major and is a recipient of the fellow and music scholarship. Her experiences include, being a soloist in Vivaldi's Gloria, performing at Wisconsin's Summerfest, singing for multiple weddings and small events, along with being in multiple choirs and her own band. Jasmine hales from the great state of Wisconsin where she has done a fair share of her singing and also won multiple state awards including; WSMA(Wisconsin School Music Association) Musical Theater solo Exemplary Performance Award, WSMA Soprano Solo Exemplary Performance Award, Wisconsin Young Choral Directors Award, WFMC State Winner Musically Advanced III *Art Song. In her free time Jasmine enjoys composing and writing her own songs along with poetry.



For that I am eternally grateful, and if you ever question whether the money you give to St. Paul's or give to this ministry is being put to good use, this year we've been able to help people with nearly \$4,000, allowing them to stay in their homes or keep their power turned on. This would normally have been impossible for us to do, my budget wouldn't have been anywhere near that amount, and yet, we've been able to help a lot of people this year.
